HI TRINITY, WELCOME TO ADVENT SEASON





Yes! It is time to celebrate Advent. As we try to get our heads around the fact that we will soon be welcoming a brand-new year, we rejoice in this Holy time of preparation! This year the Advent Season Starts on November 27. As we prepare for the Christmas Holiday, each of our worship bulletins in Advent display candles. Why? They remind us of the light of Christ, who came into the world as a light, so that the world would not stay in darkness (John 1:4), and also to remember to shine our lights before all, so that all may glorify our God in heaven. (Matthew 5:16).

Each Sunday in our Advent season series this year is anchored from the book of Isaiah. The themes, in order, are Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace.

What does it all mean? The Advent Wreath has four candles on a wreath of evergreen that is shaped in a perfect circle. This circle represents the eternality of Almighty God. Three candles are purple, and one is pink. At the center of the wreath is the Christ Candle (White). Each Sunday the candle(s) is/are lit as:

Nov. 27, 2022 Purple - Hope Dec. 4, 2022 Purple - Love Dec. 11, 2022 Pink - Joy Dec. 18. 2022 Purple - Peace

Dec. 24, 2022 Christmas Eve Candlelight Service Dec. 25. 2022 Christmas Day - The Christ Candle

Be sure to follow the Scripture Readings for celebrating Advent in between Sundays that can be found on page 3. May God bless you richly and abundantly during this joyous season and always let the light of Christ, guide you in hope, love, joy, and peace.

If you were shopping at the Lebanon







We have seen how God dealt with the heroes of faith like Moses, David and Paul, and how He prepared them for His holy purposes. How does this line up with how He deals with us today? We know that *God does not change*, so it is reasonable to assume that His methods would be similar when dealing with individuals, whether in this age or the last. But assumption is never a good practice, so let's take a look to the scriptures for the answer. God gave each of the faithful "Heroes of the Bible" the experiences necessary to prepare them for a specific future work. It seems reasonable that the methods He used to prepare them are comparable to how the Lord deals with each of us now.



When examining how God prepared these Heroes, we should try to put ourselves in the shoes of the faithful ones being examined. It's easy to look at the final results of their experiences and forget that these individuals had no idea to where it would lead. They didn't know what God had in store for them.

This should strengthen our faith during very difficult trials, and help us to maintain hope. We know that God is working for a greater good. We have seen the results of His work in the lives of the great men and women of the Bible, so we can be even more assured that *He will never leave us or forsake us.* Join us in December as we discuss how God prepared the world for the birth of Jesus.

<u>Trinity UMC - Minutes - Charge Conference</u> <u>October 25, 2022 (LIVE and ZOOM)</u>

Welcome by District Superintendent, the Rev. Jenny Freymoyer – She recognized all those present in the sanctuary, and asked those present to introduce those watching on Zoom.

Hymns sung: How Great Thou Art and Great is Thy Faithfulness

Prayer was led by the District Superintendent

Pastor's Compensation Report – After her opening welcome and prayer, Rev. Freymoyer asked us to give words that describe Pastor Jessica. Some of the words that were suggested included: caring, positive, optimistic, happy, present in the church, responsible, visible in the community, honors our traditions, and presents new ideas. The DS explained that Pastor Jessica is assigned to Trinity as a half-time pastor. Her compensation packet for 2023 is a salary of \$17,000 plus housing expenses of \$8,000 for a total of \$25,000. The conference also lists her as ¼ time hospice minister, so that she is eligible to receive conference benefits. The report was approved.

Pastor's Report - Pastor Jessica read a very thorough and exciting report about all the different teams, leadership, and volunteerism that is going on at Trinity. She expressed appreciation for her assignment to Trinity and gave thanks for the many people that she has met while at our church. A copy of her report was included in the November 2022 Trinity Times.

Nominations report – Rev. Freymoyer read the names of Chairpersons of Trinity's teams and committees and the new members that would be added to each of Trinity's work teams. The report was approved.

Membership updates: The list of those folks who had not supported Trinity by their time, treasure or talent in 2021 and were identified in last year's Charge Conference report was approved with no additions or subtractions for 2022.



Finance Report: Keith Earle - All bills including the conference apportionments are paid. Currently we have the following assets: General Fund - \$15,850.37, Money Market - \$43,158.57, and Capital Campaign - \$176,001.40. We also have an Ameriprise Financial Services Fund of \$239,339.61 that came to Trinity in a bequest. Keith noted that the 2023 budget for Trinity Church is \$ 118,150 but the anticipated income is\$20,000 less. The budget was approved, and Pastor Jessica prayed that we will be able to make up the difference. The DS suggested that we consider moving some funds into an endowment fund that would permit leaving the principal in the bank and only spending the interest each year.

Trustees Report – After reading the report to the body, Rev. Freymoyer said that she was impressed with Pastor Jessica's report and all that the trustees are doing at the church.

Christ Servant Ministers — The four CSMs at Trinity - Carol Hollich, George Hollich, Marilyn Smith, and Jack Stouffer — were all recognized for the contributions to the work of the church and approved as Christ Servant Ministers for 2023. The District Superintendent and Pastor Jessica signed the forms. The CSM Conference Director, George Hollich, will enter the reports of the CSMs into the Conference Journal and send copies to the CSM West District Director.

Our Mission **LINK** program – There was much discussion on how the Link is supposed to work by combining projects from linked churches in the area. The DS acknowledged that some work well and others don't. Our mission link has included about 7 churches in Lebanon who regularly get together for services on Thanksgiving Eve, Ash Wednesday, and Good Friday. However, most of the downtown ministers are recent appointees and although they are still meeting, the laity are no longer part of the meetings, and new joint projects are few. Rev. Freymoyer asked us how we might be able to help "fix" this issue. Carol Hollich mentioned that the combined choirs have been successful and could be the talking group for doing some activities together. Sally DeJesus mentioned that the Easter sunrise services have been well attended by the

different churches in the past. The success or failure of the Link seems to depend on the people in our city UMC churches talking about **Link** and suggesting different ideas we could do together.

The meeting was ended with prayer by Pastor Jessica.



Through social media, the influencer can advertise brand-name makeup, trendy clothing, or the latest electronic device. One influencer has even reported being offered thousands of dollars to place a brand-name beverage in the background of a video that he filmed for his social media! While an influencer's advertisements appear innocent, they are essentially pointing people to consume—perhaps mindlessly. Followers of Jesus, however, should be *spiritual* influencers for the world. John the Baptist would influence many of his peers to turn to the Lord. He would be an influencer for spiritual matters and would point others to the Lord's salvation.

A Messenger of Life

A little after midnight local time on July 30, 1945, an enemy submarine torpedoed the USS *Indianapolis*. 12 minutes later, the ship sank in the Philippine Sea. This was a tragedy for my family—my great uncle was among the hundreds of sailors who died on the ship. Several days after the ship sank, an official military messenger informed my great aunt of her husband's death. Military families fear the worst possible message from these messengers. Not all messengers bring news of death. Through a heavenly messenger, Zacharias received a message of life. God frequently calls the unassuming or the seemingly ill-equipped. Zacharias and his family was just another example of God's working through people who least expected it. Of course we are not the parents of the forerunner of Christ, but Zacharias's story shows us that God will work through our lives as well. Will we believe and trust that God, who has worked through ordinary people, in the past will work through ordinary us?

Thoughts to Consider

- 1. How can we respond with joy rather than fear to God's unexpected acts?
- 2. Are we living as a spiritual influencers, advertising through daily living that we have been changed because of the influence od God?
- 3. How can we be a messenger for Jesus to those around us?
