

<u> Adult Sunday School – February</u>



We will be considering *Justice and Adversity* in our Sunday School lessons in February. During our winter theme, *Justice, Law, History,* we looked at how God's justice is different from the concept we humans have of justice. Revenge isn't justice. On the other hand, restoration is a perfect expression of justice. Unfortunately, God's justice is often perverted, miscarried, and ignored—to man's peril. When a king strays from the path of justice, who can rebuke him? When a whole nation has forgotten—or despised—the law of God, how can the people be saved? This third unit of the guarter

explores how people who obey God can correct their pathway when injustice has become the rule of the day. Our lessons in February are entitled...

God's people bear the responsibility of seeking His justice in the face of all kinds of opposition. Sometimes, as with Job's friend Bildad, wrong doctrine about God sounds right and results in faulty condemnation of the innocent. The final lesson of the month illustrates the joy and life we can find when we return to harmony with God's justice. Ultimately, we work toward God's will enacted on earth as in Heaven and are hopeful because justice does not depend on us alone.

Any parent will tell you that children have an amazingly acute sense of justice. Even the smallest deviation from equal treatment is met with cries of "That's not fair!" Of course, parents will also note that children have a powerful capacity to conveniently bend the notions of justice to self-interest. This interpretation of justice in the hands of clever human beings, becomes an amazingly threatening concept. In fact, as we get older, it comes to look more like justice can be a powerful tool for getting what one wants. Indeed, every leader of mass murder in the twentieth century (whether Hitler, Stalin, Mao, or the leaders of Rwandan génocide) used the cry for justice to justify their grotesque crimes.





2000 years ago the Gospel writers tell us about the trial of Jesus. Each writer indicates that in both Jewish and Roman courts certain legal procedures were followed. The prisoner was arrested, charged and cross-examined, and witnesses were called. The judge then reached his verdict and pronounced the sentence. Yet the Gospels also make it clear that the prisoner was not guilty of the charges laid, that the witnesses were false, and that the sentence of death was a gross miscarriage of justice. But behind this unjust verdict were fallen and

fallible human beings, who were swayed by the dark passions of their own self-interests.

Justice transcends political parties, religious sects, and philosophical positions. To dispense justice means practicing kindness and compassion toward others which become a reflection of the heart of God, our Father. So, join us in February as we conclude our unit on *Justice, Law, History* and discuss how each of us responds to how we respond to *Justice and Adversity* in the 21st Century...

Sunday School – Justice and the Marginalized Deuteronomy 24: 10-21



Justice and the Marginalized Sunday School Handout - January 30, 2022

(A discussion of this theme will follow the 9:15 Worship Service.)

Study Texts: Deuteronomy 24: 10-21

KEY VERSE: *Remember that you were slaves in Egypt and the LORD your God redeemed you from there. That is why I command you to do this.* – **Deuteronomy 24:18**

Ignorance and Want



In Charles Dickens's *A Christmas Carol*, the Ghost of Christmas Present guides Ebenezer Scrooge on a tour of various scenes around London. Some scenes highlight holiday celebrations, while others show poverty-stricken individuals, including Scrooge's own employee, Bob Cratchit. Toward the end of the tour, the ghost reveals two destitute children beneath the folds of his robe, a boy named Ignorance and a girl named Want. The ghost warns Scrooge, "Beware them both ... but most of all beware this boy."

Through these characters, Dickens drew his readers' attention to issues of ignorance and want regarding the economic challenges of his day, which was mid-19th century England. Many people of that time and place experienced want and neglect and were marginalized. Those who were better off often adopted a stance of willful ignorance toward the situation. Scrooge's next words aptly describe that attitude: "I do not wish to see them." Unfortunately, many still react this way, avoiding issues of economic justice by looking the other way.

BEWARE OF OPPORTUNISM!

During the coronavirus pandemic of 2020, an enterprising but unscrupulous couple used the demand for hand sanitizer for their own profit. They traveled to nearby towns and purchased all the hand sanitizer they could find, storing up cases of the in-demand product. They advertised their newly acquired product at vastly inflated prices. While hand sanitizer shortages were prevalent, the couple charged several times the suggested retail! People readily purchased the hand sanitizer at the grossly inflated price. Eventually, the government intervened and redistributed the product to those in need. During a crisis that necessitated a compassionate response, this couple exploited others for profit and caused an inequitable situation. God requires his people to not take advantage of others. While many people see crises as an opportunity for personal gain, God requires fairness. What can you do to ensure that you are part of the solution rather than part of the problem?

The Power of Memory

A young family, expecting their first child, recently moved in next door. One day the young husband caught my attention and hesitantly asked, "Do you have a battery charger I could borrow?" I said, "Of course," retrieving the charger from my garage. I told him to keep it as long as needed. A week later, he brought back the charger and asked why I didn't hesitate lending it to him. I answered him with a story: "When my wife and I were newly married and had our first son, we were living paycheck to paycheck. My car battery was dying, and I was desperate to get back and forth to work. I asked my neighbor, Harvey, if I could borrow his battery charger. He did not hesitate. I used the charger every night. I wanted to treat you the same way Harvey treated me. That's why I didn't hesitate." On hearing the story, the young man replied, "That was exactly my situation!

1. Do you talk to people poorer than you differently than you talk to those who are wealthier?

2. What aid does our congregation offer the poor? How would it be missed if that support vanished?

3. How do memories of God's work in your life shape your behavior?

JUSTICE AND THE MARGINALIZED

Lesson 9, Deuteronomy 24:10-21, NIV

COLOR CODING

Color-code Deuteronomy 24:10-21 based on the key below:

Red–What *not* to do.

Green–What to do.

Blue–Reason for action.

- ¹⁰ When you make a loan of any kind to your neighbor, do not go into their house to get what is offered to you as a pledge. ¹¹ Stay outside and let the neighbor to whom you are making the loan bring the pledge out to you. ¹² If the neighbor is poor, do not go to sleep with their pledge in your possession. ¹³ Return their cloak by sunset so that your neighbor may sleep in it. Then they will thank you, and it will be regarded as a righteous act in the sight of the LORD your God.
- ¹⁴ Do not take advantage of a hired worker who is poor and needy, whether that worker is a fellow Israelite or a foreigner residing in one of your towns. ¹⁵ Pay them their wages each day before sunset, because they are poor and are counting on it. Otherwise they may cry to the LORD against you, and you will be guilty of sin.
- ¹⁶ Parents are not to be put to death for their children, nor children put to death for their parents; each will die for their own sin.
- ¹⁷ Do not deprive the foreigner or the fatherless of justice, or take the cloak of the widow as a pledge.
 ¹⁸ Remember that you were slaves in Egypt and the LORD your God redeemed you from there. That is why I command you to do this.
- ¹⁹ When you are harvesting in your field and you overlook a sheaf, do not go back to get it. Leave it for the foreigner,the fatherless and the widow,so that the LORD your God may bless you in all the work of your hands. ²⁰ When you beat the olives from your trees, do not go over the branches a second time. Leave what remains for the foreigner, the fatherless and the widow. ²¹ When you harvest the grapes in your vineyard, do not go over the vines again. Leave what remains for the foreigner, the fatherless and the widow.
