Hello Trinity


When I think of June, I think of the approaching of summer, Flag Day, a time for family vacations, and neigh-

# **Conference Theme - POSSIBILITIES!**

But Jesus beheld their thoughts, and said unto them, "With men this is impossible; but if they will forsake all things for my sake, with God whatsoever things I speak are possible." Matthew19:26

On Thursday, May 18 Pastor Jessica, Gloria Clark, George, and myself traveled to the Expo Center in Oaks, PA near Valley Forge to represent Trinity at the 2023 Eastern Pennsylvania Annual Conference of the

United Methodist Church. It was the first IN-PERSON Annual Conference since 2019! In addition to discussing and learning about the issues that face our EPA Conference and the United Methodist Church, it was so good to catch up with everyone, including past preachers Mark Young, Alice Ann Bonham, and Lynn Hackman. We also got to talk with Stanley Krall, a former Trinity member who became a pastor in Philadelphia. Many of you know he married Clarita Anderman, daughter of our former pastor, the Rev. Tom Anderman who passed away last August.

After receiving nametags and the legislative booklets, we were welcomed by music from a small praise band (5 of the band members were from different Conferences!!). At the opening session more than 700 members and visitors gathered to sing contemporary songs, the great hymns, and even sang one hymn a cappella that sounded glorious! Bishop John Schol welcomed the clergy and laity and introduced the morning speaker Rev. James Lee who reminded us that our mission is to be disciples and embrace new

possibilities. The theme of his message was: **The gap between "now"** and "possibilities" is CHANGE. He urged us to not get stuck in a rut! An offering was then taken for educational scholarships to help those going into the ministry. We were asked to match a \$5000 challenge gift from an anonymous benefactor. (At last count, we had raised over \$6500 with more expected between now and the close of the challenge on May 31.) We then divided into the clergy session (Pastor Jessica) and the Laity session (George, Carol, and Gloria).





At the Laity Session, Conference Lay Leader, Bill Thompson opened with prayer and a message. George spoke on the *Christ Servant Ministry* program and introduced Judy Ehninger, the director of the *Certified Lay Minister* program. She introduced 4 new CLMs. (CLMs are those Laity who have done additional training and are now being called upon to fill pulpits around the conference.)

Our main speaker was Mike Nelson, a 34-year-old pastor who works with youth. He said we need to have our churches be "safe" places where young people can come. It is here that we can get to know them and show that we

care, teach them the Gospel, and help them grow in Christ so that they in turn can minister to other youth. His suggestion to those churches without youth ministry programs was to seek out and combine with other churches and have one strong youth ministry program.

We then heard about the Lay Academy that will be held at Eastern University on August 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>. There will be a basic course for those interested in being Christ Servant Ministers and many other courses from which to pick. We then heard about how the Deaconesses and Home Missioners programs are serving the church in justice issues. We also heard from United Women in Faith (formerly United Methodist Women & now celebrating their 154<sup>th</sup> year) who continue to seek to turn faith, hope, and love into action. A Lifetime



Achievement Award was presented to the widow of Clifton Hubbard who passed away during COVID after years of devoted service to his church, District and Conference.

The afternoon combined session started with the Episcopal Address from Bishop Schol. His main point was that we need to welcome <u>all</u> people into our churches -- not just the ones who look like us! He urged us to get involved in the community, end racism,

grow our youth ministry, and seek resolution to the issues that divide us and drain our time and resources. "Other people matter just like you". He praised God for the Christ-likeness of the United Methodists of Eastern Pennsylvania who led people through the pandemic, were innovative in their leadership and continued to serve in very challenging times. He said, "I see great possibility in our future and our greatest possibility is through



our congregations." The Bishop then moved away from his traditional legislative seat and had a chair placed in center stage and had a conversation with the conference attendees. He encouraged us to ask questions

and share our concerns while he sat and listened.



In addition to recognizing Clergy Retirees, a Memorial Service, and Ordination there were many resolutions discussed and passed including a leadership nominations report, equitable compensation for clergy, support for EPA Advance Special local mission projects, a modified Safe Sanctuaries policy that now extends to vulnerable adults, updates in the clergy pension program, the disaffiliation of five congregations and the discontinuance of six congregations.

A new Strategic Direction was presented that outlined the conference's goals and pathway to increase vitality and effectiveness among its congregations and church leadership was discussed and approved. It included a collaborative affiliation between the United Methodists of Eastern Pennsylvania and Greater New Jersey and focused on growing transformational leaders, making disciples, growing vital mission congregations and transforming mission in our communities and around the



world. While the proposal passed by a wide margin, the introduction of the strategic direction, new budget format and collaboration with Greater New Jersey created disruption for a number of delegates who were concerned about too much change without a full understanding of the plans and process. The Extended Cabinet and the Connectional Table pledged to continue to work with more laity and clergy to better understand their concerns and slow the pace of change.



With little time left for legislation surrounding the Conference Budget, it was decided to have another Conference meeting to finish discussing and voting on the budget as well as on any other legislative items that might be deemed appropriate. An email will be sent to all delegates to determine whether the session will be conducted in-person or on Zoom. # Adult Sunday School - June



We begin the theme of the Summer Quarter, *The Righteous Reign of God*, with a series of lessons entitled "*The Prophets Proclaim God's Power*". Scientific discoveries continue to reveal the nature, expanse, and power of our universe. As a result, many are left struggling to understand the relationship that God has with his creation. The expanse of creation gives us a hint at the power and expanse of its Creator. One way that Scripture describes the relationship between God and his creation is in terms of the relationship between a king and his kingdom. God is king! And the entire created order is under his rule. This month we explore God's rule, his kingdom, and the response of his people as revealed in the Old Testament prophets with the following lessons...

June 4God ReignsIsaiah 52:7–12June 11God's Kingdom of PeaceIsaiah 65:17–25June 18God's Servant-KingEzekiel 37:21–28

This quarter of lessons highlights the righteous rule of God. His kingdom and his rule are in contrast to the temporary rule of earthly monarchs and their kingdoms. Although earthly rulers can be weak or strong, selfish or benevolent, unwise or wise, God's rule over all creation—Heaven and earth—is totally and completely righteous. God is the all-powerful king. He is not devious to gain power, because he has all the power. He is not desperate to retain power, for it cannot be taken from him. He is righteous and just. All people—then and now—are invited to enter into his righteous ruled heavenly throne. From that throne, the Lord would establish an eternal kingdom of justice.

Isaiah's message envisioned a messenger who proclaimed the good news: "Your God reigns!". Isaiah further described the kingdom as a time in the future when the Lord would establish his rule over a new heavens and a new earth. His rule would be a place where sorrow and need are no more and where harmony will be found in all places of the kingdom. The king's power will be on display in his kingdom, a place of peace where "the wolf and the lamb will feed together" (Isaiah 11:6).



The interpretation of this passage assumes it refers to Jesus' work during His time on earth. We should not think of the wolf and lamb as literal animals, but instead, we need

to see the wolf as an aggressive enemy next to the vulnerable (lamb) and think about teachings and illustrations in the New Testament. Jesus uses the wolf-lamb analogy to compare the wolf-like tendencies of some individuals next to His disciples. Paul, too, says, "I know that after I leave, savage wolves will come in among you and will not spare the flock". Without the Lord's touch on the hearts of people, some individuals will act as wolves when near God's people. The two, wolves and lambs, never calmly settle down next to the other, but Jesus radically transforms relationships. Because of the gospel, natural enemies will become lovingly committed to each other.



The prophet Isaiah lived through the Assyrian crisis, and began his prophetic ministry in about 740 BC in Jerusalem. He foresaw the coming oppression by Babylon and a time when the land of Israel would be largely emptied of its people. Even so, he offered hope for a future when "the Lord comforts his people and will have compassion on his afflicted ones". Isaiah saw a future that would involve more than a restoration of peace. He spoke of the final restoration of humanity, when "[the Lord] will make her deserts like Eden, her wastelands like the garden of

the Lord". As the passing of some seven centuries would reveal, that restoration would come through Jesus the Christ, the Son of the living God. Join us in June as we discuss "The Prophets Proclaim God's Power".

# Saul of Tarsus

### Sunday School Handout - May 28, 2023

(Thoughts to consider in the upcoming week.)

Study Text: Acts 9:1-31

**KEY VERSE:** Ananias went to the house and entered it. Placing his hands on Saul, he said, Brother Saul, the Lord—Jesus, who appeared to you on the road as you were coming here—has sent me so that you may see again and be filled with the Holy Spirit. —Acts 9:17



# "I Once Was Blind ..."

John Newton was an 18<sup>th</sup> century Englishman who served as captain for ships that transported captured Africans to North America as slaves. The horrendous nature of that occupation included not only the acceptance of slavery but also the imposition of the inhuman conditions on the ships. To do this, one needed a callous soul. In 1748, Newton was in a terrifying storm in a ship off the coast of Ireland. Fearing for his life, he began praying in a way that led to his conversion to Christ, eventually becoming a minister in 1764. He began writing about his faith, and in 1772 published the words to "Amazing Grace," an account of how God had "saved a wretch like me." One of the most memorable lines in the hymn is "[I] was blind, but now I see." While this phrase is drawn from the story of Jesus' healing of the blind man in John 9:25, it also fits the story of Saul in Damascus.

Responsive? Hiding? Fleeing?

When my youngest was a teenager, he would hide whenever some chore needed to be done. It didn't matter if it was cleaning his room, doing the dishes, or pulling weeds—I would call his name and get cricket chirps in return. My oldest son, however, was quite the opposite. More often than not, whenever I called his name, he would answer. And even though he really didn't want to do those chores, he would come running when I called him. It was responsiveness, plain and simple. The Scriptures describe varying responses to calls from the Lord. The responses recorded in Exodus 4:13; 1 Samuel 10:21–22; Isaiah 6:8; Jonah 1:3; 2:14; Luke 1:34, 38, 46–55; and Acts 10:7–8 are quite instructive when compared and contrasted in their respective contexts. The Scriptures also tell of individuals who claimed to be obeying a call from the Lord when no such call existed; see Numbers 12:2; Jeremiah 14:14–16; 23:25–26; and Ezekiel 13 as examples. Let's make clear at this point that there are two categories of callings by the Lord. First, there are the high-profile callings of specific individuals to specific tasks and then there are the general callings given to all Christians; My child who hid from either kind of "calling" in a family-household sense always ended up with unwanted consequences for doing so. Similarly, it's easier (and better) in the long run to obey the Lord than it is to disobey. Before concerning yourself with any specific calling you may be sensing from the Lord, how responsive are you to the general callings all Christians receive?

# Heads Up!

One of our favorite pastimes when we were young was tossing a Frisbee while at the beach. The sea breeze was often strong enough to carry the plastic disc far afield from its intended destination. And there were usually so many people at the beach that the disc would sooner or later strike an unsuspecting beachgoer. It was not unusual to hear "Heads up!" shouted throughout the game. Some bystanders would hear and react appropriately. Others would turn around in confusion and look for the source of the warning first—and such bystanders would be the ones to experience an unwanted Frisbee to the head! Surely Ananias didn't presume that the Lord lacked knowledge about Saul! But providentially, the Lord did not see fit to "throw a Frisbee" at Ananias's head. Instead, the Lord patiently provided an explanation that should have been unnecessary for Ananias's obedience. The same may not be the case regarding you or me the next time we hesitate to obey. When God calls on you, will your obedience depend on receiving an answer you deem satisfactory, or will you obey without question?
