March is Women's History Month

In our Revised Common Lectionary, Psalm 121 is the first Psalter reading for March 5, 2023. This is one of my favorite Scripture verses because when I was surrounded by hopelessness and despair, I experienced help from the Lord. Verses 1 and 2 read...

"I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth." KJV

Adult Sunday School - March

The theme of our adult Sunday School lessons this Spring is *JESUS CALLS US*. This month we will talk about topics that focus on those *"Called from the Margins of Society"*. In our time together we will explore some of the most basic principles of the Christian faith: 1) That Christ's invitation is open to *all* people; 2) That his resurrection changed everything; 3) And that those who put their faith in Jesus and anticipate their own resurrections are Jesus' chosen community. These truths should influence our daily life and what it means to live as a Christian in a world focused on material wealth. Our March discussions will question whether or not we are showing these principles to all those we meet.

The Prodigal Son The Greatest in the Kingdom Jesus Talks with a Samaritan Jesus Overpowers Legion

Luke 15:11–24 Matthew 18:1–9 John 4:7–15, 28–30, 39–41 Mark 5:1–13, 18-20

How often are we unable to hear God's call, to perceive God's choice, because we are blinded by our own incomplete knowledge and dependence on self? Our March lessons encourage us to examine our hearts and motives to see who we are excluding from the kingdom. In our discussions we will look at scriptures in which Jesus disregarded artificial societal barriers, and chose instead to include people on the margins.



Emotions, biases, and ignorance often stand in the way of accepting people as Jesus did; but the welcome of the prodigal son in Jesus' parable sets the scene for all sorts of surprising people who can find their place in the kingdom of Heaven. Humble children, foreigners, women, and even the formerly demonpossessed are accepted in Jesus' community.

Jesus had a particular concern for the little people, for the so-called nobodies in the world. Luke records Jesus's love for those who are neglected by the rich and the powerful. The influential are identified by C. S. Lewis as "the inner ring"—

those who walk in the corridors of power. But Jesus was concerned about the "outer ring"—those who lack social prestige and influence. We, however, are often inclined to give our attention to those with influence and power, to praise those who wield influence in the world and to follow those who are celebrated in society.

Throughout the Gospels Jesus shows concern for those who were excluded by Jewish society. Jesus tells us that the poor are blessed and at the end time blessings will belong to Lazarus, rather than the rich man who lived a

life fit for kings. Similarly, the birth of Jesus was revealed by angels to shepherds who weren't from the elite in Israelite society. Believers throughout history have often reflected on how unexpected it was that humble shepherds were told about the birth of the king of the world.

Jesus had mercy on the lowest of the low in Jewish society, casting out demons from the demonized and healing lepers and the blind. The demonized were avoided by all since they were anti-social, troubled, and disturbing. People probably thought they were forsaken by God and that there was no hope for them. But Jesus came to seek and to save the lost. During his ministry, Jesus saw every person and every person mattered to him, and they should matter to us as well. So, join us in March as we discuss those *"Called from the Margins of Society"*.

Discussion - Current or Emerging Projects that Clarify Our Ministry

- <u>Bible Studies</u> Rev. Rick Clark's Lenten Bible Study will begin on Thursday, February 23, at 10:30. We will be studying the Adam Hamilton book entitled *Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws.* Pastor Jessica's Bible Studies will continue Wednesday evenings at 6:30 on the book of Revelation. Sunday School will be at 10:30 each Sunday and is entitled "Jesus Calls Us" but will be supplemented with discussions on the Lenten Devotional Booklet.
- <u>Church Statistical Report</u> This report is in the church office and will be pretty much the same as last year since we have had our new pastor for about a half a year. We will update all numbers for the year 2023. It was noted that the amount given to UMC requests last year was \$645 and our Mission giving to non-UMC charities was \$1408. This was an increase of \$564 over last year! Praise the Lord!
- <u>Communications</u> Gloria Clark reported on the January visits to the website and face book page. We had approximately 58 visits to the website and 190 views from 13 states. We need to update our "Ministry Team" information since this is one of the pages that received the most views. People, also, looked at the newsletter, the history, and Sunday School information. On Facebook, there were 59 views, mostly looking at the worship service, bulletin, or Bible Study. Pastor Jessica suggested that the Trinity congregation visit our Facebook page and check the "like us" box. It was, also, felt that we should send the weekly worship service YouTube link to the congregation so they could see the service, if they were not able to be with us on a Sunday morning..
- <u>Clothes-to-Go</u> Barb Querry is getting a group of women together to pack up the clothes to give to Jubilee and Salvation Army. We have already given to LCCM a lot of their needed items of clothes. There may be a few items kept for people coming into the church for help.
- <u>Flood Buckets</u> Dea Kishpaugh will put a list of items needed to finish filling two flood buckets for the relief in the US. We are also asked to give donations to Trinity marked for UMCOR (relief outside of the US, especially the earthquake victims in Turkey and Syria).
- Ladies' (& Men's) Fellowship Luncheons The February "Tailgate" Lunch at the Vo Tech was well received. The March 3 gathering will again be at the Vo Tech at 10:30. On April 12 the group will meet at 12:00 at the Revive Café in Quentin. Parking is limited, so Dave Wallett has offered additional parking in the area in front of his garage. See Dave for details.
- <u>LINKS</u> Currently this continues to be a meeting of the pastors. Pastor Jessica hopes to encourage more discussions about how the combined churches can do more things in the community beyond worship services. The bulletin for the Good Friday service at Trinity has been sent to the Link churches. The pastor will also send each pastor a note inviting them to our Easter Sunrise Service
- <u>Use of Church Spaces</u> Narcotics Anonymous continues to meet at Trinity on Tuesdays and Saturdays.





Highlights from Reports that Support Our Ministry

• <u>Worship Team – Carol Hollich</u> – The Ash Wednesday service on Wednesday, February 22 will be at Good Shepherd UMC. Five of our choir members will sing with the combined choir. Pastor Jessica, Gloria and Rev. Rick Clark have decided to send out Lenten daily readings instead of having the "Lunch and Lenten services" every Wednesday in Lent. The title of the series is "Love Builds UP" and talks about family, either your personal family or your church family. Caroline Jacobs will ask for the organ to be tuned in mid-March. Palms will be ordered for Palm Sunday and Caroline Jacobs has agreed to show people how to make them into crosses. Carol Hollich is checking with liturgists and camera operators for the Holy Thursday service and the community Good Friday service at Trinity. Carol is, also, looking for 8 readers for the Holy Thursday/Tenebrae service. We will have a dedicated greeter on Good Friday plus ushers. Pastor and Dave Wallett are working out the candles to be used

on Good Friday plus ushers. Pastor and Dave Wallett are working out the candles to be used for Good Friday and Holy Thursday. Lily orders have started. The cost is \$8.00 each and we will order 35 unless we find another way to order less. Deadline to order lilies is March 12. They will be arranged after the Good Friday service and stored in the 8th Street hallway when they arrive to not conflict with Good Friday Worship Service. Sally DeJesus, Tina Washington, and Barb Querry are planning the Easter Sunrise service at Coleman's Park at 6:30. The regular service will be at 9:15.



 <u>Education – Sally DeJesus</u> – The next Sunday School craft project is 680 treats for the Lebanon School District employees and teachers (made with tootsie rolls). Confirmation class finishes up their studies on Sunday, February 19. They will be confirmed in March, date to be decided.



• <u>Finance – Keith Earle</u> – The Finance Team prepared the 2023 budget, and it was \$20,000 less than the 2022 budget. Unfortunately, based on current giving, it appears that there will still be a deficit of \$20,000 by the end of the year. We need to increase our membership to help with the overall expenses by advertising what Trinity has to offer. Among several suggestions was the need to increase visibility with fliers to the high-rise units in the area and increased usage of other media. Also, we need to keep our congregation aware of this shortfall.

- <u>Missions Dea Kishpaugh</u> UMCOR sent a thank you for our \$150 contribution in December. In January we collected 133 pounds of food, toiletries, and clothes for LCCM and this month there were 61 containers of soup brought in for Souper Bowl Sunday. We also collected winter hats and scarves. In March we are asking our congregation people to earmark their mission giving for the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) assistance with those affected by the earthquakes in Turkey and Syria. Checks made out to "Trinity UMC" with UMCOR in the memo will be forwarded to them at the end of the month. In April we usually help with the Cornwall Manor birthday party, but we are not sure about our status for this year. More info later!
- <u>Staff Parish Keith Earle</u> It was reported that SPRC has met individually with all but one of the staff members to have a conversation and review of their responsibilities and concerns.
- <u>Trustees Jack Kishpaugh</u> The trustees reported that we purchased an electric snow blower that is much more efficient and eliminates the need to have gasoline stored in the church building. They are investigating a new lighted remote sign for the corner of our church. They need to check with City Hall as to what restrictions and regulations surround the installation of LED displays. The plumber will be coming on Wednesday to remedy some plumbing concerns.
- **Parish Visitor Gloria Clark reporting** Rev. Richard Clark continues to visit the Trinity homebound and hospital patients and took poinsettias to some of our shut-ins. He saw 19 people in January and visited a few other non-Trinity people who needed a pastor's care. Jessica has been coordinating her visits with Rick so they don't visit the same people each month.



• **Pastor Jessica** – Some highlights that were included in the Pastor's report: She feels blessed to be at Trinity and appreciates all the work everyone is doing. She is working on Trinity brochures and welcome packets and has been attending community meetings on

neighborhood services to help the community. She takes monthly communion to Willow Terrace and will be providing a worship service every 4th Sunday at American House. (Someone suggested also visiting Market House where Betty Wentzel lives. She prepares a prayer booklet each month and is thankful for the prayer/communication chain that includes all those involved in our active ministry. She thanked those who helped with the confirmation class for Natalina and Liliana Harrison. Pastor hopes that we can provide coffee and snacks every Sunday after church so there is always something there for visitors. It was decided to make the first 3 spots in our parking lot for the handicapped since Calvary Church is sometimes using our Willow Street spots. It was suggested that we have a donation bottle for pennies or other amounts for our discretionary fund. Pastor also feels the need for a plan to address any emergencies that might arise during a Sunday Worship Service. You can request a complete copy of the January/February Pastor's report that is on file in the Church Office.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:50.

The Prodigal Son Sunday School Handout – March 5, 2023

(Thoughts to consider in the upcoming week.)

Study Text: Luke 15:11–32

KEY VERSE: The son said to him, Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son. **—Luke 15:21**

Family Reunions

Did you look forward to your most recent family reunion, or did the thought of attending bring dread? For many families, these occasions are joyous as multiple generations assemble for conversation, celebration, and



recollection, frequently over a cherished family meal. However, other family situations are more complicated and painful. At best, the relationships within those families might feel cold or be difficult to tolerate. At worst, those relationships might be characterized by cruelty, mean-spiritedness, or even abuse. In such a family system, whole and harmonious relationships seem unattainable. Shame or selfishness is often at the root of broken families. Scripture describes families who experienced conflict for these reasons. Would Jesus' depiction of a broken family repeat these themes? Could he use these themes to change the hearts of his audience?

<u> All-Encompassing Forgiveness</u>

John watched his life spiral out of control. He had rebelled against his parents and disregarded the commitments that he had made as a believer. Because of anger, neglect of relationships, and substance abuse, John squandered his life and ignored his relationship with God. However, John reconnected with a Christian friend who treated him with compassion and gentleness. Through this patient friendship, John realized the importance of showing repentance—to God and other people—for his previous misdeeds. John trusted that God would forgive him, and he recommitted his life to being a disciple of Jesus. John's account and the example of the younger son in today's parable should encourage you to trust the all-encompassing nature of God's forgiveness. There is no situation too shameful for God to forgive. Can the same be said of how you react to others who have wronged you?

<u>Plotlines</u>

After watching numerous romantic comedy movies, I've noticed that many of these films have similar plotlines. These plotlines include a blossoming romance, mistaken motivations, the return of a former lover, conflict between all parties, and a "happily ever after" ending. I'm now at the point where I can almost always predict the plot. The original audience of today's parable likely thought that they could predict its plot. The son had brought shame and dishonor to his father. The audience was prepared to hear that the son received harsh consequences from his father, just as the law had prescribed. The parable's plot appeared so predictable. However, Jesus inverted such expectations. The father's demonstration of kindness and generosity toward his lost son went beyond what was expected. Today's parable invites all people to embrace the upside-down nature of the family of God. In this family, God offers and desires reunion where broken relationships exist. Such actions give testimony to all people of God's generosity and faithfulness. God welcomes all people to become his beloved children in his family. In what other ways do Jesus' teachings upend your expectations?
