A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

In Ecclesiastes we read:

"He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end." (Ecclesiastes 3:11)

It's easy to worry about our world and the climate, but we are to persevere and continue to do all the good we can with the time and in the time God has gifted to us.

It is inconvenient to think that we cannot continue doing the same thing but God created the heavens and the earth. Sunday Bible Studies in October



Our October lessons continue the theme of *God's Law Is Love* and are entitled *Faith Triumphs, Law Fails.* The commandments are prescribed as rules of life. When we love, we have found the true spirit of the holy law. Paul sums it all up in love and those who have received the love of Christ, need to see the law not as a stern, condemning taskmaster but as an appealing, bright vision of understanding and blessing. Through faith in Jesus, a person becomes a child of God and receives God's love. Our weekly topics this month include...

A debt is something we owe to someone because we have gotten something from them... but in God's world the debt of love is not like that! We don't owe someone love based on the love they have shown us. We show love and forgiveness to others based on the love God has shown to us. Our debt is owed to him, but he asks us to pay it to those around us.

We can never repay the incredible love he has lavished on each of us-- but he doesn't ask us for repayment! What he asks of us is to "Pay It Forward".

Among the notable things that characterized the life of Jesus was His everlasting determination to practice genuine love toward those who crossed His pathway. If we want to be true followers of Jesus, we too must see life as an opportunity to love, and we must see people as those to whom we have the opportunity of demonstrating genuine Christian love. It's the strongest emotion that a person can feel, and the New Testament contains many admonitions to love God and others. Jesus says, "Bless those that curse you; do good to those that hate you; and pray for them that persecute you."



When COVID-19 hit, Stevie Dembro's restaurant business disappeared overnight. He had an excess amount of food left in his freezer, so he chose to make the best out of a tight situation. He started a program called "Feed Your Neighbor" where people could pay \$5 to order a meal for themselves or for others. "I come from the inner-city projects. I know what it is like to not have a meal." Dembro explained. "To have something like this happen... this is a tough situation for everybody."

Viewe th (Nei外) Six weeks later, Dembro's café had a whole wall with over 100 donated meal tickets for people to walk in and grab for a free dinner. People walked in and bought multiple meals for others to use later; one anonymous donor gave \$500. Dembro was overwhelmed with the support and needed to hire more people to help with donations as a good chunk of the meals were going to shelters, churches, and neighbors in need.

The message of Jesus is that we win over those who oppose us more easily with love than with hatred. Never lose sight of the importance of loving even during times of chaos. Sending a little love to your neighbor goes a long way. When we sow seeds of joy, we reap a crop of happiness. But when we sow seeds of discontent, we reap a bounty of unhappiness. 

budget resolution during its Special Session on September 9, and that second look led to a nearly unanimous vote of approval.

Just under 400 members that included Pastor Jessica, and Carol and George Hollich attended the session at Lititz United Methodist Church to act on several resolutions—including the 2024 budget—that were not voted on at the regular conference session in May.

Among other business items, 3 resolutions were ruled out of order, with consent by the body. Conference members approved a resolution that endorses efforts to restructure the denomination into regions, including a U.S. Regional Conference.



Inward and Outward Sunday School Handout – September 24, 2023

(Thoughts to consider in the upcoming week.)

Study Text: Romans 2:1–29

KEY VERSE: No, a person is a Jew who is one inwardly; and circumcision is circumcision of the heart, by the Spirit, not by the written code. Such a person's praise is not from other people, but from God.—**Romans 2:29**

Heart Surgery

A dear woman in a church where I ministered went into the hospital for heart surgery.

When I made a post-surgical visit, I was surprised when her husband told me the surgeon had replaced a defective valve in her heart with a valve from a pig's heart. This use of a "porcine valve" in a human heart has now been practiced for over thirty years. It is known as "receiving xenographic tissue," meaning from a non-human source. Once rare and dangerous, various types of heart surgery are now common. Included are "minimally invasive" or "keyhole" procedures, where small incisions are made and repairs involve tiny cameras and robot-assisted tools. The ultimate heart surger y is the heart transplant. In Paul's day, the necessity of the heart for human survival was recognized, but surgical repairs to a heart were unknown. It is ironic, then, that Paul unknowingly anticipated some of the wonders of modern medicine when he wrote of a spiritual heart surgery, what he calls the "circumcision of the heart." This lesson explores what Paul means by this curious choice of words.

Categorize Yourself?

I heard a flight attendant voice the following during the COVID-19 pandemic: You must wear a mask while on this flight, covering both your nose and mouth. If you do not intend to do this, please let us know now so that we can remove you from the plane. You will be free to make other arrangements to reach your destination. But be forewarned: you will not be allowed on any commercial airline in this country. Such a stern warning resulted from insults and even assaults on flight attendants by opponents of mandatory masking. Rather than obey government rules on health and safety, some people believed that their personal rights allowed them to make their own rules. Jews in Paul's days prided themselves for having a comprehensive set of rules (laws) that guided behavior. They believed that keeping these rules made them righteous and better than the Gentiles who did not have Jewish law. Yet Paul affirmed that neither Jews with the Law of Moses nor the Gentiles without that law were truly righteous. All were sinners, even if they denied it. What category are you in? Are you a proud rule-breaker, one who believes in personal sovereignty? If so, read Romans 11:17–21; 13:1–5. Or are you one who keeps the rules and feels smugly superior in that regard? If so, read Romans 3:9–20 and James 2:10. Do you sincerely believe that neither group is righteous apart from faith in Jesus Christ?

To See Ourselves as Others See Us

Denial and unawareness are part of the very definition of spiritual blindness. That's because if the one who was spiritually blind could and would admit to it, then he or she would correct the situation and wouldn't be spiritually blind! At one time, Paul needed to be struck physically blind in order to have his spiritual blindness corrected. That correction qualified him to recognize spiritual blindness in his fellow Jews who saw themselves as spiritual guides yet suffered from spiritual blindness themselves. Many people today suffer from spiritual blindness, unable to see Jesus for who he really is. They need our help! But that help won't be effective unless we first correct our own areas of spiritual blindness. And *that* correction won't happen until a spiritually mature person makes us aware of our deficiencies in this regard. Whom will you invite to be your spiritual mentor?
