HAPPY NEW YEAR TRINITY!

WE love to celebrate the New Year. We make all things new. We put away the old and embrace newness.

"Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

Isaiah 43:18-19

The above verse is what comes to mind. The difficulty is we are very good about doing the celebration of newness, but not so good when it comes to not remembering the former things!

As much as we love to celebrate newness, we do not so well embracing change. As much as we celebrate the new year, what we really tend to embrace is stagnation. We don't like to change. But growth does not happen unless we do change. Newness is not about how we celebrate; but as we grow, change is inevitable. When a plant grows, it looks different. We may have to get a new pot. We may have to cut away some parts that aren't growing for the plant to thrive.

I heard a story about a woman who loved a new plant. She would water it and cut its leaves so that it looked the way she wanted; but the plant did not thrive. It wilted and almost died until she got help from her friend who knew how to nurse the plant back to health. We cannot expect growth only in the way we want! We must accommodate the needs of the plant. In our families we may have to face new relationships, new challenges, but we accommodate the change. We don't force growth in the ways we want the result to look. We have to accept what is needed in order for growth.

As we celebrate the new year, and make resolutions and plans for the future, let us remember that if we truly want something new in our lives... if we really want to grow... we have to embrace change. Let's not think about efforts that have been fruitless in the past, but make room for growth, and feed that growth, with what it really needs. The love of Jesus.

Discussion - Current or Emerging Projects that Clarify Our Ministry

- <u>Bible Studies</u> Rev. Rick Clark is leading an Advent study on Angels. In January the group will return to finish their fall book, *Sacred Pathways* by Gary Thomas. The Adult Sunday School led by George Hollich meets every Sunday at 10:30 in the Adult Sunday School Room and is also available on Zoom. (However, on Christmas Day, December 25 and New Year's Day, January 1 there will be <u>no</u> class.) Pastor Jessica will begin another Bible Study early in the new year.
- <u>Communications</u> The Trinity Times comes out the end of each month. Gloria Clark shared information on the visits and views we get on our Church Website and Facebook page. We have about 14 people viewing our information each week. There were 47 different visitors on our website last month. Gloria asks people to send her information on calendar events and projects we are working on. Gloria also hosts the Zoom services when George is not available.
- <u>Clothes-to-Go</u> Most of the clothes have been relocated to the 8th street Sunday School classroom and are available for those in the community in need of clothing items. LCCM has a list of clothes they need for the winter and we plan in January to pack up some of our clothes for LCCM. The crafts and clothing tables still in the nursery should be covered for services and events that might need to use the nursery as a nursery!
- *Flood Buckets* We filled & sent 4 flood buckets to Mission Central in Mechanicsburg. Each bucket contained about \$125 of supplies. We are working on filling 2 more!
- Ladies' (& Men's) Luncheon We will start this fellowship time again in January. Our first meeting will be Tuesday, January 17th at 12:00 noon.
- <u>LINKS</u> There have been no meetings since the Thanksgiving Eve service. They will meet in January to plan combined UMC services for Lent.
- <u>Use of Church Spaces</u> Narcotics Anonymous is still meeting at Trinity on Tuesdays and Saturdays.
- <u>New ideas & programs</u> The ice cream social was a success. We will have another one in the spring. Pastor Jessica is currently conducting a confirmation class for 2 of Trinity's youth.







Highlights from Reports that Support Our Ministry

- <u>Trustees Jack Kishpaugh</u> The trustees are continuing to work with the new plumber on the heating system. A part has been ordered to fix the pump. The Secretary and Preacher must remember to inform the trustees and the custodian about special events at the church. The pastor wants a list of who has the new keys to the church. The list should be in the office.
- <u>Worship Team Carol Hollich</u> The organ was tuned on Saturday. Christmas Eve service has been arranged. Mike Querry will be the greeter, and Keith, Dave, and Mike will be the ushers and light the candelabras before the 6:45 service that begins with the organ recital. Dave will light the Advent Wreath and Christ Candle during the first hymn. Jack will work the Zoom camera. The small candles will be handed to people as they enter the sanctuary. The poinsettias have been ordered with the Hollichs getting extras if needed. Jack & Dave will block off the parking lot at the Eagles for the Christmas Eve service. We are still working out the Christmas Day and New Year's Day services, as well as the December 31, 6:00 Watch Night Service. Epiphany will be celebrated on January 1st and the baptism of Jesus will be celebrated on January 8th. On January

15 there will be an installation of our leadership teams for 2023. Also discussed at the most recent worship committee meeting was the cost of the fresh flowers for the altar. The plan is to purchase several artificial arrangements for the times when we do not have a person purchasing live altar flowers. Currently we purchase our altar flowers from Grumbine's because they deliver. There will be more discussion on this topic at our next meeting.



• <u>Education – Sally DeJesus</u> – Pastor Jessica has started a confirmation class that meets after the church service each week. She has several helpers. Sally also has a craft class going at the same time. The *crafters* made 100 Thanksgiving favors for Willow terrace in November and are working on ornaments for the Christmas Eve service. In January they will begin to make 1400 favors for the Lebanon School District teachers and workers.



• <u>Finance – Barb Querry</u> – Our November deposits were \$3000 less than the expenses. The cost of maintaining the church has risen. One of the examples given was the doubling of the cost of natural gas (which we use for heating the church) that was experienced in the signing of our latest natural gas contract. Our treasurer, Keith Earle had to transfer money from other accounts into the general fund to pay bills. We will try to offset some of these rising expenses by looking at different investment strategies.

- <u>Missions Dea Kishpaugh</u> In November, we signed cards for inmates, sent 200 pounds of food to LCCM, filled four flood buckets for UMCOR, and sent 34 Christmas stockings to Church Women United. In January, we will collect hats, gloves, and scarves for the Lebanon school children or LCCM. You just might see a January Christmas tree in the parlor where we can hang our donated items!
- <u>Staff Parish Keith Earle</u> The December meeting focused on asking Pastor Jessica about her impressions of Trinity and if she had any problems that needed to be discussed. The Pastor expressed how friendly and nice everyone at Trinity has been and how much they made her feel welcome. She also indicated that she wanted to coordinate visitations with the Parish Visitor, Rick Clark so that there are no duplications and more people can be visited. The yearly evaluations of the staff will begin in January.
- <u>Parish Visitor Rick Clark</u> Rev. Rick Clark visited 8 people in October and 9 people in November. He hopes to take communion to the home bound and include more folk in his December and the New Year's visitation schedule. He and Pastor Jessica had fun trying to find Mike Querry in the Med Center because Mike was put into the system with his "other" name, Larry
- **Pastor Jessica** Pastor Jessica reported on what she sees happening at Trinity now and in the future. Some of the highlights from her report include her plans to begin a Bible study on January 11th at 6:30 p.m. She, also mentioned the preparation of a monthly prayer bulletin and a Funeral Guidelines booklet. She looks forward to updating the prayer chain and being involved in the planning meeting to create a calendar of events for 2023 on January 8th. Looking to the future, she hopes to reinstitute some of the projects that were halted due to Covid and hopes to see a Christmas Concert in December 2023. She is considering the purchase of guideline books for each team leader, so they know their duties and responsibilities. A complete copy of her report is on file in the Church Office.



The meeting was adjourned at 8:50.

Adult Sunday School - January



God's Promises are the focus of our lessons in January as we continue the winter theme of *From Darkness to Light*. This unit of lessons to start the New Year comes from the Old Testament historical books and prophets and describes God's promises to His people. The Old Testament writers reminded the people that God's promises were reliable and trustworthy. At the dedication of the temple in Jerusalem, God promised to be a present help for Solomon. *But... God's promises of presence and deliverance would apply as long as the people acted justly and worshipped God purely.* God's promises addressed the people during their moments of need and the prophets offered a way for the people to hear and

understand God's promises. However, the people would be required to change their behavior. They were to consider how they might serve others and avoid acting oppressively to those around them. In January, we are reminded that God's promises bring hope, but also responsible living...

It isn't easy to wait. It demands persistence when common sense says "give up." It says "believe" when there is no present evidence to back it up. As gold is purified and shaped in the white-hot heat of a forge, so we and our faith are purified and shaped in waiting. This was the message of the prophets to the people of Israel who were experiencing exile. The people's situation came as a result of their failure to live faithfully and justly as God's called people.



In Thornton Wilder's play The Skin of Our Teeth the character Mrs. Antrobus says

to her spouse, 'I didn't marry you because you were perfect. I married you because you gave me a promise.' She takes off her ring and looks at it. 'That promise made up for your faults and the promise I gave you made up for mine. Two imperfect people got married, and it was the promise that made the marriage."



One of the exciting moments as a young child is when parents promise something special. The moment the promise is made everything is different. Even though the actual fulfillment of the promise may be a long way off... it has the power of changing the entire atmosphere for the moment! Can you remember when mom or dad said, "I promise ... if you are good."

The interesting thing about a promise is the power it has to change us long before any of the promise is even realized. Because a promise gives something to look forward to, to hope for,

to anticipate, it actually holds great power in the present without even being realized until much later.

God Promises to Hear and Forgive Sunday School Handout – January 1, 2023

(Thoughts to consider in the upcoming week.)

Study Text: 2 Chronicles 7:1–22

KEY VERSE: If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land. **—2 Chronicles 7:14**

Forgiveness as a Lifestyle



Brian and Candy's 40th wedding anniversary was a hard-won victory. As their children, grandchildren, inlaws, and friends gathered, some people remembered another time, years earlier, when that marriage had almost ended. The family's spending had become so extravagant that Brian had involved himself in illegal business practices to cover the costs. When he was found out, he had faced possible jail time. As a result, Brian and Candy spent time talking through the issues that had led the family to such overspending. They changed the spending habits that had led Brian to search for money in unethical ways. And over time, Brian and Candy rebuilt their marriage—they chose forgiveness as a lifestyle. Divine forgiveness is also a choice, requiring action from both God and His people.

<u>Uprooted</u>

A few minutes after midnight on March 3, 2020, a tornado ripped through my neighborhood in Nashville, Tennessee. The tornado stayed on the ground for over an hour and traveled more than 60 miles. According to estimates, it was the sixth most destructive tornado in US history. More than a year later, most of the devastation was no longer visible, with one glaring exception: the utter lack of trees. On multiple occasions in the first few months after the tornado, I found myself wondering if I had gotten lost in my own neighborhood. Uprooting the trees changed everything. This image comes to mind when I read that God warned the Israelites that He would uproot them from the land if they were unfaithful. This happened in an act that left the land and the people forever changed. How will God respond if *we* turn away and forsake Him?

Temple Turmoil

In his book *Jerusalem Besieged*, archaeologist Eric H. Cline notes that Jerusalem has been "destroyed at least twice, besieged 23 times, attacked an additional 52 times, and captured and recaptured 44 times." That's a lot of turmoil over 3,000 years! Instead of focusing on Jerusalem in general, it is more insightful to focus on the first two temples in particular. Solomon's temple stood for nearly 400 years until 586 BC. The second temple, dedicated by Zerubbabel, stood for several centuries more, until it was destroyed by the Romans in AD 70. By promising His presence in the temple, God offered the people protection and stability if they were willing to follow Him. But God also made promises about what would happen if the rulers and people failed to follow Him. While sin has consequences, often dire, neither sin nor its consequences can utter the final word about the relationship between chosen people and their God. The loss of David's kingdom led to the greatest gift of all: salvation through Jesus' blood, bringing us out of our exile in sin and into God's kingdom. Are we on high alert as we follow God? Or are we a bit too casual about our "temples"?

Thoughts to Consider

- 1. What circumstances cause you to wonder whether God has heard your prayers?
- 2. In the new year how will you take care of God's temple—both your body and the church—as acts of dedication to God?
- 3. What are you doing now in hopes that God will bring it to fruition later?
