# Sunday Bible Studies in September

"Who among the gods is like you, Lord? Who is like you—majestic in holiness, awesome in glory, working wonders" (Exodus 15:11). The overarching theme of the Fall Quarter is Celebrating God and in September we consider how "God's People Offer Praise". Our discussions this month capture the gift and privilege of worship, the acts of celebrating God for who he is and his work in our lives and in the world. Moses expressed amazement and awe through his worship, and these studies will explore worship that creates in us the same response.

One of the lessons that life teaches is that less can often be more. Less exercise can become more health problems. Less food can become more quality of life. Less is also more when life becomes too complicated and we try to please too many people. Less is more when we do so many things that we forget what is really important. Less is more when we get so focused on rules and regulations that we lose sight of what we were trying to accomplish in the first place. When it comes to religion, it is often true that less is more. We tend to complicate things. But we can find places in the Bible where it all boils down to one thing, "God's People Offer Praise."



These first four lessons show several individuals who praised God in different ways and in different circumstances. These lessons provide examples of praise-filled lives. They show us individuals who had serious flaws, or who faced great challenges in life, but who, nevertheless, rendered praise to God.



Moses, looking down on the corpses of the Egyptian charioteers, sang with confidence: "Your right hand, Lord, was majestic in power. Your right hand, Lord, shattered the enemy". King David, dancing with reckless abandon, reminds us to praise God for his great power, even when—or especially when—we might be worried about what others think or how they will see us. Bartimaeus, a man who had been blind for many years, shows us how trust and praise are connected, even in the midst of our difficulties. Finally, the quarter includes the example of the first people who responded to Peter's preaching on the day of Pentecost. Luke records the ways in which lives changed because of obedience to the gospel. Reformed lives

resulted in an orientation of praise and worship, daily breaking of bread, sharing of food, and worshipping "with glad and sincere hearts, praising God". In our lessons this month we will learn the characteristics of *persons of praise*. We will see that they do not focus on externals and appearances, but are persons of praise on the inside, in the heart. So join us in September as we consider how *God's People Offer Praise*!

#### **Discussion - Current or Emerging Projects that Clarify Our Ministry**

- <u>Open Letter to Ad Council</u> A letter from Keith Earle asked the board to consider several ideas to help Trinity grow. Some suggestions were to merge with another Methodist church in the area, become a mission hub for another church, host another church in our building, start a contemporary service, or move to a smaller building. After discussion several agreed to contact other churches in the area so that action can be taken on some of the discussed items. Pastor Lynn will speak with the district office and local church clergy. Mary Gruber & Sally DeJesus will call those we haven't seen at church and ask them what would make Trinity more meaningful and bring them back to worship. George will check with other church leaders in the area to try to come up with the current feelings as to how other congregations are dealing with current challenges. All 3 will report back to the October Ad Board meeting.
- <u>Bazaar</u> We received \$2950 from our members last year in lieu of having the 2020 bazaar because of Covid. Considering the current increase in cases brought on by the Delta variant, we do not feel comfortable having a live Bazaar and will again ask our congregation to consider a "Bazaar" donation during October and November.
- <u>Bible Studies</u> Rick Clark will resume his Bible Study class the end of September. He will be sending a list of possible books to discuss to those who have been part of these Thursday Bible Studies. Any others who may be interested should contact Rick to be included in the mailing. Pastor Lynn will continue her Tuesday book readings.
- <u>Communications</u> Gloria Clark has created a new church website which is up and running. It is most impressive and user friendly. The website address is ... <a href="https://trinityumclebanon.squarespace.com">https://trinityumclebanon.squarespace.com</a>. Everyone is asked to send the church office information about new programs, missions, worship services, etc. that will be held at Trinity so that our website includes the latest information. The report from the SPR team suggests that we may be using multiple people as office staff so that an office presence, as well as website, Facebook, and zoom productions can be handled efficiently.

#### **Highlights from Reports that Support Our Ministry**

- <u>Education</u> Sally DeJesus Nothing new to report on education, but Sally will find out the details for Boscov's, "Friends Helping Friends" day.
- <u>Finance</u> Barb Querry As of July 31, 2021, Trinity has \$11,883.20 in the general checking account, \$176,001.40 in the Capital Campaign Fund, and Judy Kendig's estate of \$232,222.99 is currently in *Ameriprise Financial Funds*. Other investment options are being considered. A round of applause was requested for Mary Gruber, Keith Earle, and Barb Querry for their leadership in finance.



#### Administrative Council Minutes page 2

- <u>Missions</u> Dea Kishpaugh In July we sent 166 pounds of food and supplies to LCCM. We also sent over 207 school items plus \$176.00 for "Stuff the Bus". The congregation is to be commended for their generous giving and encouraged to keep bringing in food items for LCCM. Considering the devastation in Haiti, Rick Clark will provide an updated list of items needed for flood buckets for UMCOR. Thanks to Dea and Jack Kishpaugh and helpers for leading our Church Mission projects.
- <u>Parish Visitor</u> Lori Grandi (final report read) Lori sent in her letter of retirement from the position she has held for 22 years. Her last day was July 31<sup>st</sup>. Because Covid made it impossible to make in-person visits, Lori revised her work schedule to send notes and cards, as well as making regular calls to our homebound. We thank Lori for her many years of service to Trinity's home bound members. Her presence in the homes and lives of our homebound members will be missed.
- <u>Staff Parish</u> Reba Sterner There were two staff members who submitted resignations since our June meeting. Lori Grandi is stepping down as church visitor after 22 years of service, and Carol Yeagley is leaving the area and her position as church office secretary for the past 3 years. Letters of thanks and appreciation will go to each of these staff members. Mary Gruber, Pastor Lynn, and Reba Sterner will take care of this. We are looking to fill the church visitor position. Currently we have 17 home bound members, plus those in the hospital. We are currently considering the use of two people for the secretarial position: One for communications, computer, website, and technology items; and the other as a presence in the office... perhaps twice a week for printing the weekly bulletins and Trinity Times, mailings to the homebound, answering the phone, etc. We will need to determine the salary and number of hours needed for each position. Staff Parish will hold another meeting in 2 weeks to finalize the job descriptions and begin interviewing potential candidates. Thanks to this team for a very important meeting update and extra time spent on these issues.
- <u>Trustees</u> Jack Kishpaugh The large freezer and silver refrigerator in downstairs back kitchen have been turned off since they are not in use right now. New LED lights will be put into the sanctuary, hall, and offices. UGI installed a gas line into the white house next to our parking area at the alley. UGI will erect a bollard to protect that meter and pay us \$2500 for the right of way. Thanks to this team for all their extra work at the church.
- Worship Team Carol Hollich We are waiting for the organ tuner to make several adjustments. Caroline continues to record the Prelude and first hymn for the Zoom service and Carol and George produce the rest of that service. We have asked Dan Shenk (sound technician) to put a camera in the balcony that will be controlled on a computer in the back of the sanctuary. He will add wiring to the sound board so we can show the live service with good sound. However, he has not given us a timeline as to when this can be accomplished. After the Cicada Festival (where he runs the sound for all the concerts), we will again try to get this begun. We are thinking the church picnic (September 19<sup>th</sup>) can still be held at North Lebanon Park because we are outside. It was recommended to have the food ordered and brought in rather than people bringing buffet items. An alternative is to have everyone bring their own lunch. We decided to have a Zoom service at 9:15 followed by the picnic at 11:30 without worship. A group will be planning this day. More to be announced in the September newsletter. If you wish to be a greeter at the in-person service, please sign up on the office door at church. Flowers in memory or honor of a loved one can be placed on the altar providing that the office secretary has been notified. Keeping the offering plate in the back of the church and having an usher bring it up front during the Doxology works well. We will use bread cubes and juice trays for Communion, but the pastor has to let the congregation know when to partake the elements.

built by human hands. **—2 Corinthians 5:1** 

# Faith, Not Sight

A science-fiction movie portrays a future world where an evil alien monster can influence people through eyesight. Those infected this way commit destructive acts, even suicide. The solution is to live blindfolded—unable to be infected but also ill-equipped to navigate the currents of life. A climactic scene has the heroine attempting to navigate a dangerous river with two small children, all three blindfolded in a rowboat. That fictional tale bears some resemblance of how a Christian is to live. Christians are not "blind" to the evils of the world. We see them. And the way we can avoid that dark influence is because we also "see" the Lord's way—the way of faith based on evidence. Ours is not a blind(folded) faith. It is a faith based on evidence, a faith grounded in the facts of history. When a crisis looms, will we walk by faith or by something else?

# <u>Camping?</u>

I once heard a comedian explain in five words why he never went camping: "Because I have a house." He then went on to poke fun at an imagined sequence of events. Our ancient ancestors initially slept out in the open. With the passage of time, they eventually saw the advantage of sleeping in caves. As more time passed, they moved on to sleeping in huts. After a few years of that, can it be imagined that anyone would say, "I've got an idea—let's go back to the cave for the weekend!" The comedian then elaborated on how camping appliances were little more than poor imitations of appliances at home. Being a non-camper myself, all this rang hilariously true to me. I think I understand the appeal of camping (getting close to nature and closer to our Creator), but the bottom line is I don't go camping because I have a house. Yet as much as I like to hang my hat on that fact, I must remind myself that my earthly houses—my current physical body and my place of physical residence—are temporary. I should be a good steward of both resources, while not trying to cling too tightly to either. Hmm ... Could it be that campers have an advantage over us non-campers in that regard?

## FLYING AS FAITH?

Would travel by air be an example of faith? Think about it. We get into a massive machine that is much heavier than air, and we willingly yield control of our lives for a couple of hours to people we don't know. We do so even when visibility is at or near zero. We do so even though we might not understand how the GPS navigation works its wonders. We do so even when we are very well aware of the plane crashes we hear about from time to time. All the above has to do with a certain type of faith—and there's more than one type. We might call this type "airplane faith"; it is a faith based on historical evidence that chances are much greater than 99 percent that your plane will make it to its destination safely. It is not "blind faith," another type, which is mere belief in something without any objective basis for that belief. Our faith in the future that God promises is not a blind faith. Rather, it's faith based on the historical fact that God's track record is that of 100 percent reliability. Is that the kind of faith you have and witness to others? If not, why not?
